1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "African American His-
5	tory Act".
6	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
7	In this Act:
8	(1) AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY.—The term

"African American history" means the history of Af-

9

1 rican Americans, including the history of African 2 peoples beginning in the African diaspora through 3 the present day, that illuminates the passage to the 4 Americas, slavery, abolition, reconstruction, and the 5 civil rights movements. This history also includes a 6 focus on the innovations and contributions of Afri-7 can Americans to society both past and present, and 8 the impact of African Americans on the history and 9 development of the United States. 10 (2) AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY EDUCATION 11 PROGRAM.—The term "African American history education program" means an educational program 12 13 relating to African American life, art, history, and 14 culture, including programs— 15 (A) using digital, electronic, and inter-16 active technologies; and 17 (B) carried out in collaboration with ele-18 mentary schools, secondary schools, and post-19 secondary schools. (3) Director.—The term "Director" means 20 21 the Director of the National Museum of African 22 American History and Culture. 23 (4) ESEA TERMS.—The terms "early childhood education program", "elementary school", "local 24 educational agency", and "secondary school" have 25

1 the meaning given such terms in section 8101 of the 2 Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 3 (20 U.S.C. 7801). 4 SEC. 3. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED. 5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Director, in accordance with any program of the National Museum of African American 6 7 History and Culture established before, on, or after the 8 date of the enactment of this Act, may use the funds appropriated under section 5 to carry out any of the fol-10 lowing activities at the discretion of the Director: 11 (1) Developing and making available accurate, 12 relevant, and accessible resources to promote the un-13 derstanding of African American history, which may 14 include digital resources and other types of resources, such as print resources and traveling exhibi-15 tions. 16 17 (2) Through a social justice and anti-bias lens, 18 convening experts, providing opportunities for dis-19 course, and engaging with the public through pro-20 gramming, educational resources, and social media. 21 (3) Through a social justice and anti-bias lens, 22 increasing resource capacity, technical support, and 23 content creation to engage various audiences in-per-24 son and via online platforms.

1	(4) Creating, expanding, and disseminating
2	scholarly work through research, curricula, in-house
3	and traveling exhibitions, publications, and program-
4	ming.
5	(5) Providing language translation of the work
6	of the National Museum of African American His-
7	tory and Culture, including scholarly work, research,
8	traveling exhibitions, publications, programming,
9	pamphlets, and other information distributed about
10	activities funded under this Act.
11	(6) Expanding the collection acquisition and
12	collection access processes, including staffing, con-
13	servation, processing, and digitization.
14	(7) Augmenting one or more of the following
15	African American history education program activi-
16	ties:
17	(A) Development, dissemination, and im-
18	plementation of principles of sound pedagogy
19	for teaching about African American history.
20	(B) Provision of professional development,
21	such as, but not limited to, through—
22	(i) local, regional, and national work-
23	shops;
24	(ii) teacher trainings or engagements
25	in conjunction with African American his-

1	tory education centers and other appro-
2	priate partners;
3	(iii) engagement with—
4	(I) local educational agencies;
5	and
6	(II) early childhood education
7	programs, elementary schools, and
8	secondary schools that are inde-
9	pendent of any local educational agen-
10	cy; and
11	(iv) operation and expansion of a
12	teacher fellowship program to cultivate and
13	support leaders in African American his-
14	tory education.
15	(C) Engagement with State and local edu-
16	cation leaders to encourage the adoption of re-
17	sources supported under this Act into curricula
18	across diverse disciplines.
19	(8) Creating, developing, implementing, repli-
20	cating, or taking to scale entrepreneurial, evidence-
21	based, field-initiated innovations for museum im-
22	provement, and evaluating rigorously such innova-
23	tions.
24	(b) Online African American History Edu-
25	CATION RESOURCES.—

(1) Website.—The Director may use the funds 1 2 appropriated under section 5 to develop and main-3 tain on the website of the National Museum of Afri-4 can American History and Culture content des-5 ignated for educators, students, and families to im-6 prove their awareness and understanding of African 7 American history. 8 (2) Information distribution.—The Direc-9 tor may use funds appropriated under section 5 to 10 distribute information about the activities funded 11 under this Act through the website of the National 12 Museum of African American History and Culture, 13 and may respond to inquiries for supplementary in-14 formation concerning such activities. 15 (c) Continuation of Activities.—To the extent that the National Museum of African American History 16 17 and Culture is engaged in an activity described in sub-18 section (a) or (b) on the date of the enactment of this 19 Act, the Director may use the funds appropriated under 20 section 5 to continue that activity. 21 SEC. 4. ANNUAL REPORT AND BRIEFINGS. 22 (a) Report.—Not later than February 1 of each year, the Director shall submit to Congress, and make available to the public, a report describing how the funds

made available under this Act have been used—

- 1 (1) to create and promote educational activities;
- 2 and
- 3 (2) otherwise to carry out this Act.
- 4 (b) Briefings.—Not later than 6 months after the
- 5 date on which funding is first distributed under this Act,
- 6 and annually thereafter, the Director or the Director's
- 7 designee shall brief the Committee on Rules and Adminis-
- 8 tration of the Senate and the Committee on House Admin-
- 9 istration of the House of Representatives on the programs
- 10 and activities carried out under this Act.
- 11 (c) Sunset.—Subsections (a) and (b) shall cease to
- 12 be effective on September 30, 2028.
- 13 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
- 14 There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
- 15 this Act \$2,000,000 for fiscal year 2024 and each of the
- 16 4 succeeding fiscal years.
